Graham Miller has stood down as our Secretary but remains a Trustee. The whole idea is to separate the Committee from the Trustees, so we have a two tier system. Until next May I will be the only Trustee on the Committee but will take a back seat on any Trustee issues until I stand down as Chairman in May next year.

The idea behind this is to ensure that there is no conflict. The Committee will be in full control of the day to day running of the charity but overseen on legal aspects by the Trustees.

I've said it before, but will say it again, the whole idea of Blood Bikes is to transport urgent items between NHS hospitals, but we have grown so big we have to run it on similar lines to any business and unfortunately politics and legal issues come along with it and believe me they're a real pain. Please be patient with us as we go through a transition, you're a great team and lovely people.

We've got quite a few motorcycle trainers in the charity, and they've been getting their heads together, muttering in corners....the result is that we're pleased to be able to offer our riders the opportunity to do the DVSA Enhanced Rider Scheme, free of charge.

If you don't yet have an advanced rider qualification, this could well be the course for you. It's ideal as the next step towards the full advanced qualification and will take about a day to complete (probably split up into different sessions over a number of days). It won't qualify you to ride one of the charity's liveried bikes, but it will give you a great foundation for further training which will help if you progress to Advanced training. Plus, it will give you a Certificate of Achievement issued by the DVSA (which may get you a discount on your insurance). More than anything though, it's meant to be a fun course, because we all learn more when we're enjoying ourselves.
