Preston hospital workers line the grounds to pay tribute to worker who died of Covid-19

Chris Mortimer, 71, who worked for more than 20 years at the Royal Preston Hospital in the pathological lab as a phlebotomist, died on the 18th November after contracting Covid-19.

As a mark of respect, staff at the hospital requested that his funeral cortege be driven passed the main entrance and the hospital flag was lowered to half-mast. A single North West Blood Biker, Paul Pain, led the cortege through the Hospital grounds at the request of our honourary member and pre-analytics Manager, Maria Burn and Chris's Family.

Chris's daughter Tracey, 51, said: "We weren't expecting so many people to come and stand outside and pay their respects all because my Dad was a phlebotomist, and we were really grateful that a blood biker escorted the hearse through."

He was still working part-time up to his death.

Tracey said: "He was very adaptable and he had brilliant people skills. He even volunteered to take blood at events run by the hospital for prostate cancer screenings.

Lancashire Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, said: "Our thoughts and deepest condolences are with the family and loved ones of Chris Mortimer at this time.

The Camaraderie and Dedication of members of our group knows no bounds. Here's a message from East Area Manager Neil Demaline:

"I had an op on my elbow in September where they removed a 3" tumour. As a result Trevor Goff, my Deputy, has pretty much run the daily basics on East which has helped my recovery no end. We speak on the phone a couple of times a week, to make sure everything runs smoothly. Without Trev I would have really struggled."

Neil goes on to say: "I have 2 fully functioning legs and 1 fully functioning arm and the other arm will be okay soon, if I keep working on it. I still have to wear a metal brace (picture) which locks my arm at 90° but I am now allowed to take it off in bed, hopefully I will be allowed to take it off permanently in 6 weeks."

"My gob still works, so I'm sorted. The tumour was benign, so consider myself lucky. I've been off work since the end of September and have found that not being around people during the day while Julie is at work is challenging. I've been that tired I've been in bed by 7 or 8pm every night for the past 3 months."



"During the first Lockdown I had loads I could do, but this last time I've been very limited because I could only use the one hand, but I can now make a one handed chilli and tie my laces, which was a real challenge. My cat "Poo bear" (don't ask) has not left my side and sleeps on my pillow or under the duvet with me. I think she might miss me when I go back to work"

Neil would like to send special thanks to Peter Leonard and Dave Clough for unwaveringly spending a lot of their own time over many days moving bikes around and getting repairs done, and he goes on to thank all East Riders for filling in the yellow boxes on the Rota at short notice. (ed) That is mirrored throughout our group, fantastic people and camaraderie.

Good Luck with the arm Neil, and I think I speak for all of us.


There was an incident at Chorley Hospital a few days ago that all members and Hospital staff need to be aware of and need to be on the alert for any repetition.
