Chairman's bit:

As you know in May we have our AGM and we will have been going 4 years, and an incredible 4 years it has been. By the time you read this we will be approaching 21,000 successful call outs.

I have recently been asked to complete a survey, which was sent to me by the Secretary of NABB (Steve Ryder) asking for our full title (I was tempted to put "ANGELS ON TWO WHEELS" but put our proper title instead), how many members we had, how many call outs we had completed in 2015 and how many we had done so far this year, so very proudly I did, and let me tell you no other Blood Bike Group in the WORLD has come close. I say the world because NABB have had enquiries from both the USA and Australia asking how we set Blood Bike groups up, so it would appear we are going International.

Now there's a thing, have we any volunteers wishing to fly across the pond or around the world to show them??? ☺ Don't all shout at once.....

Going back to the AGM 8th May 2016, very soon we will get emails from our Secretary asking for nominations for roles on the Committee and at the AGM those who attend will get to vote for their selected member who has been nominated, so I hope as many of you as possible will come along.

We are not certain of the venue yet as the original one, the Tickled Trout, has had to pull out as they have a wedding on that date so we are looking for

another suitable one. There is one being looked into, but the Secretary will let you know where it is ASAP.

Bikes:

As some of you know we are having several problems with the liveried bikes, from age related issues to faults on brand new ones, (notably the Triumphs). Fortunately the Triumphs are being fixed under warranty, but it still takes a bike off the road and we can't afford down time. Unlike big organisations we don't have the ability to have enough spare bikes or even hire them in so we have to put up with it. Thankfully many riders are willing to use their own bikes or cars if the weather is bad.

Very soon we will be looking at buying another new bike and at the moment, having spoken with the Fleet Manager, the Yamaha looks favourite. Whilst the Triumphs come at a massive discount direct from Triumph, if they can't do the job, they become more expensive not just in costs but in time off the road. The Yamaha FJR is used by both Police Forces and Paramedics and have proved their reliability time and time again, and they are the only bikes tested by the Metropolitan Police forensic transport labs as safe over 80mph carrying blood boxes, so it seems a no-brainer, but more on that later.

Software Development Update:

As you may already know we are currently working with a team from socialcoders.org on the development of our own bespoke software.

We have 2 project managers, Jason and Nikki, who are working with us in building the software. Like us they are volunteers and do the coding in their spare time to help reduce the costs of building software for charities like ours. It's estimated that they will save us around £5000, (and just as important take us away from the sometimes fickle Google Docs).

Phase 1, which is the membership section is progressing nicely. Due to the varying access levels required throughout the charity it's taken longer than expected, but the barebones of the project is in place. The development server is in the process of being set up and then we will be shown the initial build.

Why membership first? This was decided as the best option by the developers as the rota and dispatches rely heavily on the data held in the membership section. Data will be extracted from the membership and used for both the generation of data in the rota (phase 2) and the dispatch system (phase 3). Phase 2 and 3 will
