
# Chairman's Bit:

This was the scene at the gathering point, the Auction House, just off junction 36 of the M6 this morning (Friday 18<sup>th</sup> May 2018, a day we will never forget) when Vice Chairman, Lee Townsend gave a briefing to the bikers ahead of the funeral procession. At a rough count, at least 470 bikers.

Amazing, there were Blood Bikers and bikers from all over the UK and from Southern Ireland. As far away as Dublin, Cornwall, Sussex, Suffolk, Scotland and many more areas and all in the name of the Brotherhood of Bikers, be they Blood Bikers or just free spirits.

I have to say a massive thank you to everyone, but special mention to our Secretary, Graham Miller and our Fleet Manager, Simon Hanson, because between them they organised the route and logistics, and Lee Townsend for being the family liaison with Russell's family, keeping them and us informed of everything as it was happening. Likewise, Rob Clarke, North Area Manager and all other who knew Russell well.

The people of Kendal were also amazing, especially at Westmorland General Hospital where staff and even patients waited outside and applauded when the cortege went through and slowed to a stop for a brief moment.

On every junction and every corner on the route to the Parish Church, people waited to pay their respects as we passed.

I can't forget Cumbria Constabulary. We had a Police bike rider at the front, making sure we were safe and a Police Officer or PCSO at every major junction and the officers at these junctions each showed their respect by either bowing their heads or saluting as the cortege went by.

If it didn't bring a lump to your throat, you are not human. I had to constantly fight back the urge to cry and at one point failed.

Lee said to me, he had read through the poem he was going to read out in church 100 times to try and get through it in one go, but hadn't managed it without emotion kicking in. Well when he read it in Church he didn't manage it again, and at the same point if you looked around at "Rufty Tufty Bikers", you would see they were not so Rufty Tufty, including me. Such a poignant poem written by a Biker. For those who didn't hear it here it is:

'But here we consider what's inside, and how many good deeds you've done. And bikers, well generally speaking, they've accomplished far more than have some. First:

By now most are aware that the Freemasons in our area have given us funds to buy new bikes, as well as Frieda and the Rotary. #### We 'will' carry on:

Year 7, where have those years gone? Annual General Meeting done and new Committee in place. So, what does the future of the charity hold?

There was only one position on the charity which was challenged, and that was for the post of Vice Chairman. The nominees were Lee Townsend (the outgoing Vice Chair) and Graham Jones (Founder & Trustee). Lee was voted in, but my sincere thanks to Graham for still being there as a friend too.

Over the past few years we hope we have established a bedrock which will continue to let us do what we do. No doubt the NHS will change in some way, it has to, or it will fail, but that's political and as Chairman I am not allowed to voice political thoughts, but it doesn't stop me thinking them  $\odot$ .

There are some interesting things on the horizon. A Surgeon at Addenbrooke's Hospital in Cambridge, has asked if all Blood Bike Groups in the UK would be willing to help with a trial by transporting biopsies from potential transplant organs to one of 6 Hospitals around the UK. The answer, "of course we will".

Another is the possibility of having a Doctor on board our Air Ambulances. Up to now the helicopters have Paramedics on board in our area of the North West. Paramedics cannot administer blood to patients, they can only administer a supplement.

Some Blood Bike Groups already run blood on a daily basis to the Air Ambulances in their areas, because they carry a Doctor and it is being discussed here, so watch this space.

At the AGM I informed everyone there that this year will be my last year as Chairman. I'll have done 7 years by then and I think it needs someone younger to progress this fantastic charity. I will however remain as a Trustee, just to keep an eye on things ©.

Thanks to all members, new and old, for your support. It certainly is a fantastic charity with fantastic people, all with the same state of mind, to help others.

I hope this next 12 months keep us going from strength to strength.

If you are like me, a bit of a technophobe, then it can be frightening, but there is help at hand, and the following is from **Neil McCall**:

Thanks to a donation by Microsoft Nonprofits, we have been able to provide all our members with a NWBB Lancs & Lakes email account. The donation from Microsoft is worth up to £108,000 per year.

As well as business class email with a 50GB inbox, all our members will also benefit from access to office online, 1Tb of cloud storage, online meetings and Instant Messaging through Skype for Business, the ability to collaborate on documents with Sharepoint, intranet site for each area plus other features for producing reports or sharing tasks. All this is within a GDPR compliant environment.

As part of the issue of the NWBB Lancs & Lakes email addresses, all our members will be required to use these email addresses to access our online rotas. By now all of our members should have received details of how to access their email account and link the account to google to ensure access to the rota. A committee of volunteers has been set up in the Lincoln area and they are dedicated in obtaining as much evidence as possible about the exploits of Bomber Command in the last war. They are also running a competition on Google <u>www.bombercommandmedal.com</u> and later delivering all their information to the Military Medals Review in order to get Bomber Command Members a medal for their work in WW2.

The leader of Bomber Command, Bomber Harris as he was known, asked Mr Churchill to award this medal to Bomber Command at the end of WW2, but it was refused.

*This year the R.A.F. will be celebrating their Centenary and this committee feel that this will be the opportunity to present all their findings to the Military Medals Review.* 

My feelings for what it's worth, are that these very brave people helped us win the war and should be treated the same as all the other personnel. If you have any evidence, please contact them.
